## *A Message from the Minister*

## **FINDING STRENGTH, KNOWLEDGE, POWER AND COURAGE**

In his book, *Healing Grace*, David Seamands, former professor of Pastoral Ministries at Asbury Theological Seminary, shares the story of a farmer who had fallen on hard times. He had several difficult years when his crop production was below normal, resulting in deep financial challenges. While meeting with his banker, he said, "I've got some good news and some bad news. Which would you like to hear first?" The banker replied, "let's get the bad news out of the way first." The farmer said, "with the drought and inflation, I won't be able to pay anything on my mortgage this year." "That's pretty bad," the banker observed. "It gets worse," said the farmer. "I also won't be able to pay anything on the loan you allowed for the new machinery I purchased." "My, things really are bad," the banker exclaimed. "Well, it's worse than that," the farmer continued. "The money I borrowed to buy seed, fertilizer and other supplies; I can't pay that back either." "That's just awful," the banker said, "But now tell me quickly; what's the good news?" "The good news," said the farmer, is that I fully intend to continue doing business with your bank."

Taken in reverse, the good news of the gospel, understood by the disciples of Jesus on the day of Pentecost, is that God continues to do business with sinful, even morally bankrupt, individuals. Following Jesus' death, resurrection and ascension into heaven, the disciples were, in the words of Pastor James W. Moore, "spiritually bankrupt: their minds confused; their confidence shaken; their nerves jangled; their strength sapped; their energy depleted; and their

hearts empty." The weeks leading up to the Day of Pentecost were fraught with emotional highs and lows that tore at the commitment and resolve of these vulnerable followers of Jesus Christ. The appearances of Jesus to his disciples were among the high moments; his words about leaving them were the low moments. The thought of Jesus leaving them overwhelmed the disciples with fear and grief. Just when the disciples believed things couldn't get any worse, Jesus told them that he expected them to take up his ministry of love, sacrifice, commitment and grace when he returned to heaven. The disciples protested: "We can't do it. We don't have the strength, the knowledge, the power or the courage." "There is no need to worry," said Jesus. "I will send the help you need in the form of the Holy Spirit." Jesus made good on his promise and the disciples found the strength, knowledge, power and courage to change the world in the name of Jesus Christ.

The same strength, knowledge, power and courage are available to each of us who are committed followers of Jesus Christ today. The promise of Pentecost is that God, in the form of the Holy Spirit, is as near to us as life itself. We are never alone in this life. Such assurance provides us with the commitment and resolve to attempt bold things for Jesus Christ in the world in which we live. Instructions on how to accept and use God's gift of the Holy Spirit are provided each time we gather for worship as the community of believers known as The Church in Aurora. I look forward to worshipping with you this Sunday.

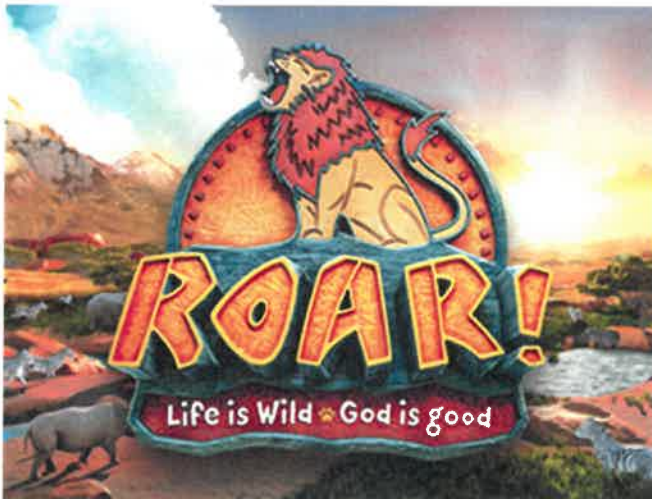


## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION NEWS

**MODERATOR'S REPORT** from Jimmy Eavenson

The Church in Aurora Board met on Monday, May 13.

A few excerpts from topics discussed at TCIA Board Meeting:

Our Treasurer reported that 2019 revenue was \$5,522 above budget while expenses for the year were \$16,544 below budget, resulting in a net surplus of \$22,066 above budget for 2019. The surplus can be attributed to the savings due to the timing of filled and unfilled Church staff positions.

Lay Leader Workshop was held on Saturday, May 4, 2019. The attendees enjoyed a workshop with a focus on leadership, communication and cooperation as we move forward as a church together in fulfilling our Mission and Vision. Many thanks to Walt Chapman and Daryl Koning with assistance from Phil Thom of ICCC for putting this workshop together.

Nine new member groups (families or individuals) have joined in the first five months, and more are contemplating.

Door security procedures involving Deacons, Greeters, committees and other groups were discussed, and the current policy was reiterated.....exterior doors should be locked unless monitored. It was agreed, that due to recent incidents, the North Chapel door will remain locked unless opened via a key or key-card. Signs will be added near the walkways with messages directing people to the Main (West) entrance. MEMBERS can always get a key-card.

We have had requests from several families to offer a service on Saturdays. This is being researched to better understand the expectations and requirements.

Our Cub Scouts have asked if they can march with the Church on the 4th of July. Community Outreach

will advise how Cub Scouts, Scouts and Girl Scouts can be involved.

The sound system in Fellowship Hall was apparently damaged by lightning, and it is just now failing. Trustees and IT are coordinating a quick fix so that the system is functional, but then the brains of the system will most likely be replaced with an updated system with enhanced surge/lightning protection.

There appears to be a need for a position to address social media needs and concerns. This most likely would be a paid intern.

Donations are still needed for Phase 2 (Library, Hanson Hall, Choir Room, and Child Care Rooms) and Phase 3 (Fellowship Hall, Sanctuary) renovations.

Archives' needs of cataloging and digitizing documents/items can be initiated anytime with assistance from the Aurora Historical Society.

The January 29, 2012 edition of the Code of Regulations continues to be reviewed for update considerations (grammar, format, etc.)

The Farmer's Market is scheduled for June 12 – August 28, 2019.

TCIA board meeting adjourned at 9:04 PM. The next meeting will be June 17, 2019.

The special congregational meeting held on May 19 had 165 members in attendance. The Pastoral Search Committee provided an update to the status of the Sr. Pastor search, and then a 1 ½ hour session ensued with verbal and written questions. Many suggestions were brought forward, and the Committee will consider all and plan for the future.

### *Biblical Evidence~Archeology*

Bible: Then And Now by Jenny Roberts (1996)
